

Most of the costs are in Tiers 2 through 5, which have fewer resources and are typically not connected digitally to others. Industry 4.0 technologies create opportunities for competitive advantage for the smaller players by allowing them to establish self-organizing networks with anyone.



NMSDC Central® is the platform for NMSDC's national database of more than 10,000 certified minority suppliers.

NMSDC provides referrals to corporate buyers of minority suppliers capable of providing quality products, services and solutions.

Corporate Plus® is a membership program for minority businesses with proven capability to execute national contracts.

The Business Consortium Fund (BCF) provides working capital loans and access to specialized financing to NMSDC-certified minority businesses with supplier/vendor relationships with NMSDC national and regional corporate members.

The Growth Initiative creates a certification category for minority-controlled firms that allows NMSDC-certified MBEs to retain minority status and control while accepting equity capital from institutional investors.

Advanced Management Education Program (AMEP) is a four-day customized executive education offering at Northwestern University's Kellogg School of Management with highly intensive training and technical assistance for Chief Executive Officers of minority-owned firms.

Minority Business Executive Program (MBEP)is a one-week intensive course offered in partnership with the University of Washington's Foster School of Business. The program features an interactive curriculum focused on finance and accounting; human resource management; leadership; marketing and brand strategy; and relationship strategic thinking.

The Business Opportunity Exchange is a platform for minority suppliers to present their company's products, services and solutions to hundreds of prospective buyers in one location.

Continuing Education Seminars are available annually to national and regional corporate members in support of minority supplier development. Networking opportunities allow suppliers to engage directly with appropriate purchasing agents.

The Global-Link International Program guides development of a worldwide network of non-governmental organizations that provide linkages between historically-excluded businesses and corporate buyers abroad. The Business Consortium Fund (BCF) is a non-profit Community Development Financial Institution (CDFI) focused on providing financing to NMSDC-certified MBEs.

The BCF has a long history of success in providing a wide range of financing options to suit the needs of growing MBEs. Lines of credit, direct loans, factoring loans and participation loans with a local bank in your area are all available.

The BCF has made more than 990 loans totaling over \$233 million to NMSDC-certified MBEs since 1987. In 2012, it launched a direct lending program.

Two years later, the BCF was approved by the U.S. Department of Treasury as a Community Development Financial Institution. As a result, the BCF can provide important Community Reinvestment Act (CRA) credits for banks that participate in BCF loans, and extend its capital base by applying for matching grant funds from the U.S. Department of Treasury, which in turn enables the BCF to make more loans to eligible MBEs.

The primary loan products offered by BCF are the Loan Participation Program, the Direct Lending Program and the BCF-Sponsored Factoring Program.

The Loan Participation Program

In this program, the BCF participates in a portion of a loan to an MBE, along with a local bank. The MBE receives a working capital injection related to a contract with an NMSDC Member Corporation that is often beyond what a local bank lender alone would provide. BCF's portion of this type of loan can be up to \$1.125 million. The banks' portion may be much higher.

The Direct Lending Program

BCF direct loans may be used for a variety of purposes and can be in the form of either a term loan or line of credit. Loans range from \$100,000 to \$1.125 million.

BCF Sponsored Factoring Program

BCF can sponsor an MBE with a participating factoring lender to reduce the percentage rate the MBE pays over what is available in the market. This can be a useful financing option for companies with fewer assets to increase their cash flow for on-going operations.

In July 2014, the BCF received approval from the Small Business Administration (SBA) to activate its long-dormant subsidiary - Triad Capital Corporation. This adds to the BCF's ability to provide long-term funds to MBEs that have proven themselves in the supply chains of corporate America and are ready to ascend to the level of prime/ first-tier vendors.

These changes are critical for corporations looking for strong, vibrant and well-capitalized MBEs that can grow with them. By contributing to the BCF, these corporations can now gain a "multiplier effect" with the BCF and SBA-helping to provide the funding their suppliers need.

The BCF's support for MBEs doesn't stop at providing access to capital. The BCF also provides advice to further educate MBEs on key areas of financial management.

The advice is hands-on and provides financial management training, and addresses the significant challenges faced by minority suppliers as they enter and grow through the supply chains of NMSDC member corporations. Topics covered include designing profitable growth models, strategic pricing, cash flow management and performance management.
